

The 1,707 square foot house has three bedrooms and two bathrooms with a two-car detached garage. The house is set back from the street, behind a fence that encloses a southern exposure garden. The garage is in front of the left side of the house.

4. Evaluation

Reasons for selection for DOCOMOMO documentation

Intrinsic value

4.1 technical evaluation:

The house was one of the first, perhaps the first, to combine the California Ranch design with large glass walls and floor to ceiling glass doors. It sprung directly from the California life style, the seamless blending of indoor and outdoor living, and contributed to promoting that life-style nation-wide.

The American West in the Twentieth Century reads, "Another architect, John Funk, revealed the possibilities of large glass surfaces in conjunction with ranch design in his Heckendorf House in Modesto, California, which began this trend-setting pattern in the state." 4.2. social evaluation:

John Funk designed this house for his wife's sister Rebecca Cox and her husband Marvin Heckendorf. John was 31 years old and this was one of his first houses. He had worked for William Wurster until 1938, and then spent the summer of that year touring Europe with his wife. He spent time visiting the Finnish architect Alvar Aalto.

4.3. cultural and aesthetic evaluation:

This was one of John Funk's first houses and it brought him international attention. Funk, together with William Wurster, Gardner Dailey, and other architects developed the Central Valley Modernism Style of architecture which combined the openness of the International Style with the regional traditions and materials of interior central California.

In 1941, the house won an architectural award from House and Garden Magazine, Class 1, Zone A.

In 1962, Donald E. Crum ASLA won an American Society of Landscape Architects award for his design for this house's landscape. See Modesto Bee, June 1, 1962, page E3, *Honors for Outdoors*.

4.5 historic and reference values:

The New York Museum of Modern Art included the house in its trend setting exhibition, *Built in the USA*, which also toured the United States. MOMA published four books in the 1940s that featured the Heckendorf House, and several popular magazines and scholarly journals published articles on the house. It has been featured in several books about 20th century architecture. The Museum of Modern Art, in its book, *If Want*

to Build a House (1946) held the house up as a model of what a modern, low cost house could be.

The success of the house and the national attention it received inspired other Modesto residents to hire important west coast and national architects to design their landscape, commercial, residential, and government architecture, including William Wurster, Frank Lloyd Wright, Gardner Dailey, John Bolles, Milton Pflueger, Christopher Alexander, Henry Hill, Joseph Esherick, Thomas Church, Lawrence Halprin, and many more. Beginning with the Heckendorf House, Modesto's architecture became a model for other cities and a laboratory in the development of Central Valley Modernism.
